Anyone who, like me, was long open to the EU idea, benefiting from free borders and subsidized study programs like the Franco-German friendship initiative, is rubbing their eyes in disbelief. Since the sanctions, at the very latest, the EU has completely dropped its mask. The Brussels Leviathan formally has no jurisdiction over criminal law, nor any administrative apparatus in the member states. Nevertheless, it can impose political sanctions on citizens, sometimes more severely than any state governed by the rule of law – for behavior that is not prohibited by any law! The EU can effectively condemn anyone to social death, based on decisions made by the Council of Ministers and mere suspicion. The EU has become a collective of subjugation and coercion. Alexis de Tocqueville was right 200 years ago when he warned of the totalitarian tendencies of democracy (using America as an example). However, the EU was never a...

Demagogue persecution 2.0: A talent for bad remakes

No punishment without a law is a fundamental principle: the principle of legality. In the EU's sanctions system, one learns from the media, not through a court ruling, that one is essentially "out of social life." The political ban can strike anyone who has ever spoken positively about Russia, perhaps even traveled there, sat on a panel, or said anything else that the EU classifies as "disinformation." You can then try to regain your freedom with the money frozen by banks: Good luck with that.

Those who end up on the sanctions list are deprived of all means of subsistence and can even be deprived of a basic means of subsistence—a form of collective punishment without prison bars for families. Furthermore, no one is allowed to give those affected, such as Jacques Baud ([here is a petition](#)), Nathalie Yamb, or Hüseyin Doğru, even a piece of bread without threat of punishment. The EU, which is built on the principles of solidarity and subsidiarity, punishes citizens for every sign of solidarity at a basic human level.

Europe has a knack for bad remakes. The costumes get more modern, but the mechanics remain the same: first the grand promise of peace through order, then the confusion of order with obedience, finally the fear of free speech – and in the end, as the punchline, the revolution that no

one wanted, but which is ultimately inevitable? After Napoleon, Europe was not only militarily defeated, but also a mental wasteland of its own certainties. At the Congress of Vienna, Metternich invented the grammar of stability: balance, restoration, control.

Where a love of order prevails, a mania for control eventually takes hold, and ultimately, ideological surveillance (the EU has plans for its own intelligence service and is already scrutinizing the spectrum of opinion). Prevention began back then with the monitoring of thoughts: Carlsbad Decrees, persecution of demagogues, surveillance of universities, restrictions on the press; free spirits fled abroad: Börne, Heine, Büchner. Today, literary prizes are named after their intellectual giants—and often tainted with woke ideology. Order has become a religion; deviation, heresy. The lesson from 1848, the failed scholarly revolution, remains: Thoughts are free. Those who sow unspiritualism will reap eruptions. And that is what will ultimately lead to the EU's downfall.

Ten reasons why the EU will fail

1. She's making a fool of herself because she is one. More satirists in the EU Parliament!

Hardly anyone takes the entire EU construct seriously anymore; it has no spirit, no face, no compelling idea. It's an empty shell that is now beginning to lash out ever more fiercely as the winds of time whistle around its weary bones.

2. She hasn't understood the Streisand effect, like all censors, cancellers, and wannabe totalitarians, of which there are plenty in the media and government. In the internet age, you can't commit dirty deeds in secret; the victims are all over YouTube the next day (even if their books have been pulled from stores—why, exactly? Does the act of buying a book fall under the ban on supporting such activities, not just the payment of royalties to the authors?).

3. It creates its own martyrs. People love stories more than decrees. In the end, every child will know the stories of [Nathalie Yamb](#), Jacques Baud, and [Hüseyin Doğru](#). The outcasts of yesteryear are often the titans of the future order.

4. She doesn't understand altruistic punishment. The oppressor creates opposition figures on an assembly line every day. Those who practice arbitrariness and celebrate harshness radicalize even dutiful accountants and housewives. Trump became president through unfair reporting – and the BBC's top brass have since resigned. If it were the other way around, public broadcasting wouldn't be suffering from historically low levels of trust, while the AfD is soaring to new heights in the polls.

5. Audacity goes a long way, but in the end, stupidity rarely prevails. Everyone sees the EU's stupidity through their own fault: The euro is entrusted to an ECB president convicted (but not punished) of embezzlement; von der Leyen, a politician's daughter with a pharmaceutical background, orders billions in vaccines via ~~(deleted)~~-text message from Pfizer, which itself is among the most heavily sanctioned companies in the world for its own misconduct; the most corrupt countries are courted: are they hoping for better kickbacks from cocaine-addicted politicians in Ukraine? It's now heading in the direction of the arms industry. Who else are they trying to fool?

6. Because it betrays its own principles. Anyone who has studied European law has been bombarded with fundamental and human rights at every level, the most sanctimonious regulatory preludes, and the ever-present, grand symbolic overtures. Charter of Fundamental Rights here, "European Constitution" there. The bigger the masquerade, the deeper the fall into disillusionment. Great ideas reliably die in the acidic environment of pseudo-legitimacy.

7. Because hypocrisy only makes one helpless for a short time, but ultimately breeds the most hatred. The EU is an "area of freedom, security and justice"—what a parody, what a mockery.

8. Because overconfidence comes before a fall. Nobody believes the politicians' rhetoric in the end: I bet. Who wants to die for a migration-ridden free trade zone? *Anyone?*

9. Because morality is not enforced through power, but through example. The EU doesn't seriously intend to oppress 450 million people from different cultural backgrounds simultaneously, does it?

10. Because history repeats itself. And we may and will witness it.

And now, come on, just sanction *everyone* , Uschi! Rule us all properly. Show everyone what and who is really behind the EU!

The sooner the better.

Europe as an idea does not die when the EU falls – but flourishes when the peoples of Europe awaken.
